TASK GROUP 124 Application of the Principle of Justification



Mandate

The principle of justification is intended to ensure the net benefit of a proposed activity that would alter radiation exposure. While the concept is simple to understand, its application, including the basis for judgements and the process for reaching a decision, is not straightforward. Task Group 124 is deliberating on practical application of the principle of justification.

The TG takes particular note of situations where radiation exposure is a major concern, and at the same time, societal and ethical values are considered to have important implications. The following are guiding questions that were identified by the TG to focus discussions and development:

- How to implement a holistic approach to justification in the context of wellbeing?
- How to consider the social impact of activities involving radiation, whether or not it leads to actual exposure?
 How to value benefits in health, economic and societal contexts, and how to compare them with harmful effects of radiation including those from potential exposure?
 How to balance individual rights and the common good?
 How to consider and value the benefit of protecting nonhuman entities and ecosystems?
 How to identify and involve stakeholders in the process of justification, and who is responsible for the final decision?
 How to keep consistency of the principles of radiological protection as a whole?

Process

Open topical workshops are organised in cooperation with liaison organisations in formal relation with ICRP to draw lessons from past experience. The workshops are expected to involve experts in different fields to cover various aspects of justification.
